C. Wright Mills suggests that understanding the intersection of social history and personal biography is our most needed quality of the mind. He called this understanding the "sociological imagination".

Using the available resources, summarize the major stories of the day (globally, nationally, state, local, etc.). Then, using your "sociological imagination", analyze the importance of your biography and this history in your life. You should also look at how the society you grew up (and are a part of) in was shaped by the "events of your day".
