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Introduction:

Ancient Egyptian civilization was completely dependent on the Nile River. Its annual summer floods deposited rich soil along its banks, making the land very fertile. Egyptians also relied on the Nile for irrigation and transportation. The river was so important to their livelihoods that they often spoke of it in religious terms, referring to it as a god.

Directions:

You will read the "Hymn to the Nile" to see how the Egyptians viewed the river. You'll also see pictures of a Nilometer, a structure the Egyptians used to measure the height of the river. As you read the text and look at the pictures, think about why the Nile was so important to the Egyptians and why they spoke of it and treated it with such respect.
